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WELLINGTON-GUELPH 2024 Everyone Counts - Point-in-Time Count

The 2024 Wellington-Guelph (W-G) enumeration of homelessness was part of a coordinated Canadawide count of sheltered and unsheltered individuals experiencing homelessness on a single night.

The Wellington-Guelph Everyone Counts survey is an anonymous and voluntary survey completed with individuals experiencing homelessness. It asks about certain demographic characteristics, health concerns as well as other factors related to experiences of homelessness. The responses to these questions provide insights into the needs of people experiencing homelessness.

*The 2024 results include 227 individuals who completed the survey + 7 dependent children, and 101 individuals identified through administrative data (including 7 families with 16 dependent children) bringing the total to **335 individuals experiencing homelessness.**

Methods

Wellington-Guelph 2024 Everyone Counts was planned and carried out with community service agencies that make up the Wellington-Guelph Housing Stability System. The 2024 count took place over two days in Guelph and over three days in Wellington County with a total of 53 staff from 15 agencies participating. Teams completed the survey of individuals experiencing homelessness at designated headquarters, community agencies, and various outdoor locations, including encampments. Royal City Mission served as the headquarters in downtown Guelph, while the Social Services offices in Fergus acted as the County's headquarters.

Once again, a unique identifier was integrated into the survey allowing staff to identify and count individuals experiencing homelessness who did not complete the survey and were known to be staying in emergency

or domestic violence shelters on October 23, 2024. The unique identifier was used to ensure no one was counted more than once. It is important to emphasize that we still are not capturing the full extent of homelessness in our community.

Wellington-Guelph Service Area

The County of Wellington is the Service System Manager for the Wellington-Guelph service delivery area which includes Wellington County and Guelph. The County is responsible for the delivery and administration of provincially mandated subsidized housing, government-funded affordable housing and initiatives to prevent and respond to homelessness.





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Survey Results

Staff working from the Wellington-Guelph Housing Stability System completed 227 surveys with individuals experiencing homelessness representing a total of 234 individuals (227 adults + 7 dependent children) experiencing homelessness on October 23, 2024. The following information is based on the survey results.






