Crime

Crime Unit

Supervisor: Acting Detective Sergeant Brad Olsen

The Wellington County Major Crime Unit (MCU), led, assisted, or managed 27 Benchmark Occurrences in the month of December 2022. These incidents included 12 Sudden Death investigations, 6 Fraud investigations, 2 Criminal Harassment investigations, 2 Theft investigations, and 5 reported Sexual Assaults.

Two Detectives have been seconded fulltime to a major case under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigations Branch (CIB) which has led to a 3-month learning and development opportunity for a frontline member, in the form of a Temporary Acting Assignment (TAA), commencing in early January.

Another Wellington MCU Detective has recently accepted a fulltime position with the OPP West Region Provincial Asset Forfeiture Unit (PAFU). This will commence in mid-February, creating a vacancy within the Wellington MCU and an opportunity for Detachment personnel interested in pursuing criminal investigations.

All National and Ontario Sex Offenders, Hate Crime / Extremism investigations, High-Risk to re-offend Offenders, and High-Risk Domestic Violence Offenders, continue to be managed by the Wellington County Major Crime Unit. The Wellington MCU is also assisting other Major Crime Units and routinely provides guidance to uniform personnel on criminal investigations. The Unit continues to follow-up leads, prepare for court, and investigate several major cases which fall under the direction of OPP CIB.

In terms of Crime trends, there's been a noticeable increase in 'Sextortion' incidents within Wellington and neighbouring counties in the month of December. These incidents typically involve victims, often underage, sharing intimate images through social media. The images are then accessed by unknown suspects and used to extort the victims financially in exchange for not distributing them to the victims' contacts. The uptick observed in Wellington County is consistent with national and international trends seen in recent months. The Wellington MCU is addressing the issue through investigation, with the assistance of the OPP's Child Sexual Exploitation Unit (CSEU), as well as through public education in the form of media releases and social media messaging. Several resources have also been supplied by the Wellington County Youth Resiliency Officer to assist frontline members in providing education and support to the victims and family members affected by these incidents.

Additional, in the month of December, one of the Wellington MCU Detectives spearheaded, and subsequently hosted, a joint-forces conference for OPP and municipal Police Services to collaborate on several connected armed robberies, which have occurred in West and Central Regions in recent months. These services included the Caledon OPP, York Regional Police Service, Peel Regional Police Service, Barrie Police Service, Woodstock Police Service, London Police Service, Waterloo Regional Police Service, and Toronto Police Service.

Community Street Crime Unit

The Community Street Crime Unit is responsible for investigating property crimes and drug related activity within the detachment area. The CSCU mandate has been updated to include that CSCU is responsible for tier one and tier two drug offences. These include possession, possession for the purpose of trafficking, trafficking and other drug related offense requiring specialized assistance.

Wellington CSCU is comprised of four Detectives Constables and one Detective Sergeant. Detective Constables are selected from within the detachment and have a tenure of four years with the possibility of an extension of one year. The Detective Sergeant position is currently awaiting a positing for a Provincial Candidate. CSCU members are professional and well respected within the organization. Members have the utmost flexibility and dedication to their work.

CSCU members receive intensive and specialized training in warrant service entry, general investigative techniques, criminal investigations, mobile surveillance, and human source handling among other specialized training. CSCU units within the OPP work collaboratively with each other, front line patrol and other support services to effectively manage cases and gather intelligence.

CSCU members are also active outside of policing, giving back to their community by coaching sports such as hockey, baseball, basketball, and football for the youth within Wellington County. One of the members was an integral role in coordinating 'Shop with a Cop', which is the epidemic of community policing.

Detective Constable KALCSICS has been extended in his temporary assignment to Wellington CSCU. DC KALCSICS has gained significant experience in a short time in investigating drug and property crime cases. Upon the completion of this temporary assignment, candidates for future temporary assignments will be selected. Providing direct mentorship supports the units' goals of operations continuing past the completion of full-time members tenures.

CSCU is actively engaged in local drug trafficking investigations that are linked to property crimes and overdoses. CSCU members are working on multiple mid-level drug investigations that have a direct impact on the safety of our communities. It is anticipated that some of these cases will be concluded in the early part of 2023.

CSCU has reached out to partnering police agencies and other OPP Detachments in response to a series of commercial break, enter and thefts that have occurred within the month of December. There appears to be similarities and Wellington CSCU is investigating links between the cases.

CSCU assisted frontline members in the execution of a search warrant relating to a dangerous driving occurrence involving one of the frontline members who was nearly struck by a vehicle. The case is continuing.

Members gathered intelligence from human sources to further cases within Wellington County and provided necessary information to investigators from other areas.

Despite many of our members taking a well-deserved rest during December, it was a very productive month.

Frontline

Below are some highlights from the month of December 2022 for B & D Platoon in Wellington County.

B Platoon

B Platoon recently welcomed two new members to the shift. Constable Mooney joins the shift as an experienced transfer from the Toronto Police Service, and Constable Langhorn joins the shift from C Platoon as a new Acting Sergeant. Both members come to us with a plethora of experience, and we are happy to have them.

Our members are always eager to learn and improve their abilities as police officers. The following officers completed recently completed training:

On December 23rd, 2022, B Platoon was on duty for a once in a generation winter storm that struck Southern Ontario. Blowing snow and ice made for treacherous roads resulting in multiple collisions and countless members of the public stranded in rapidly deteriorating conditions. Members of B Platoon, despite the great risk to their own personal safety, responded to every call and did what they could with increasingly limited options. Several officers chose between duty and family and stayed overnight so that they would be ready to go for the next shift.

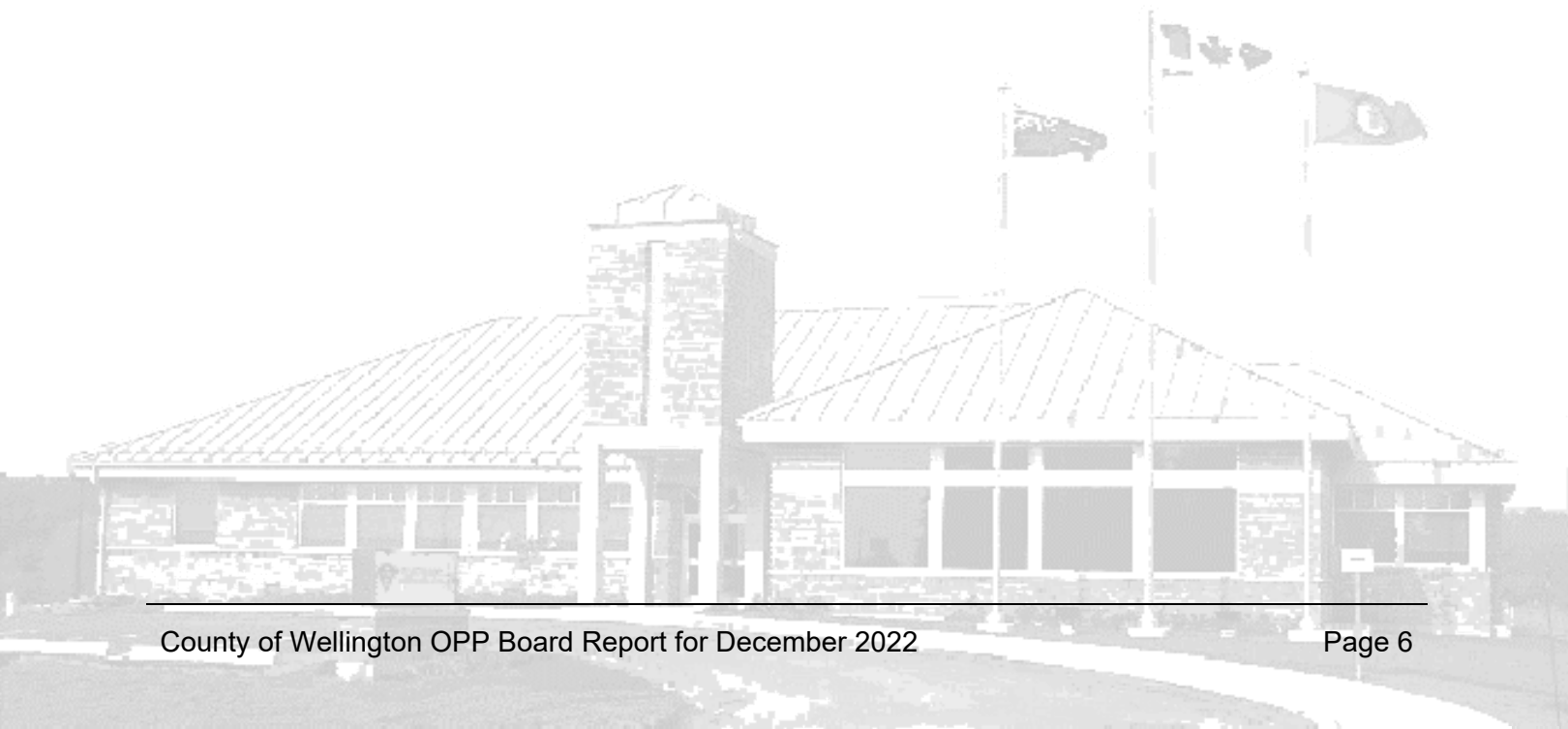
December 24th was marked by a record number of calls for service in West Region as the storm continued – upwards of 460 by late afternoon. Officers focused on the rescue of stranded motorists who were forced to spend the night in their vehicles on roads, taking calls for service for new collisions, and handling regular calls for service. Several officers became stranded themselves however were able to get back to work in short order.

B Platoon's members exemplified a commitment to duty and doing the right thing for the right reasons.

The Auxiliary Unit completed the year by participating in several events throughout the county. One of the highlights for the Unit was assisting the Centre Wellington Food Bank with a “Stuff A Cruiser” event

at Freshco in Fergus on Dec 10 and 11. We had six members attend over two days. Feedback from Jackie at the food bank was positive. Over the past year we have participated in three food drives with the Centre Wellington Food Bank, whereas pre-Covid we would normally do one food drive, reflecting the increased needs in the community and we are pleased to be able to support the food bank whenever we are able.

In addition to the food drive, we had members assist at parades in Mount Forest, Fergus, Palmerston, Rockwood, and Alma. Several members contributed hours doing patrol with regular members throughout the month. Interviews are being scheduled for four new Auxiliary applicants; credit goes to Liaison Officer PC Kyle DRAVES who organized recruiting sessions geared towards the Auxiliary Unit here in Wellington County. Some of these new applicants are the result of these recruiting sessions.

Finally, I am pleased to announce that Steve MONIZ was promoted to Auxiliary Sergeant this month. Steve has served with the Auxiliary Program for several years and his experience will be valued in his new role.



Crime Stoppers

Stoppers Guelph Wellington (CSGW) once again put the community on the provincial and international stages, thanks to numerous Crime Stoppers awards in recent weeks.

The Ontario Association of Crime Stoppers (OACS) annual awards for 2021 were announced November 5, 2022, at the online annual general meeting. The Crime Stoppers International (CSI) awards were announced virtually from throughout the United States, Africa, Bermuda, and Australia from Nov. 21-25.

CSGW falls in to the 100,001-299,999-population category for OACS and 0-300,000 population category for CSI.

OACS

CSGW was named to the Best Digital Award for The CSGW Series offered online in January 2021 for Crime Stoppers Month. The videos, which are still available on the CSGW YouTube channel, focus on the history of Crime Stoppers, Cyber Safety, and Victim Support.

The Best Radio Feature award was presented to CSGW for the submission offered in partnership with The Grand at 101. The October 2021 episode with Producer McKim Ecclestone and guest host Austin Cardinell focused on the importance of fundraising, the issue of identity theft, as well as crime prevention.

CSGW received the Special Project Award for the work done in partnership with Wellington County OPP and Victim Services Wellington on the #HTinWC and #SAinWC initiatives. The purpose of this campaign was to increase awareness of Human Trafficking and Sexual Assault in the County of Wellington.

The Online Excellence Award, an open class with no population specified, was awarded to CSGW for the quality of content on its website, www.csgw.tips as well as its social media presence on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, YouTube, and LinkedIn.

For the seventh year a row, CSGW received the Marla Moon Memorial Award of Excellence for its population category. It has never previously been awarded to a program seven years in a row.



All awards are posted on the OACS website and are announced on the organization's social media platforms following the annual general meeting.

CSI

The Best Media – Television Award was named to CSGW for the segment recorded with Launch It Minto's Somer Antonopoulos who hosts What's On in Minto for Wightman TV. The episode focused on online presentations, community crime prevention, and the role of fundraising. This episode aired on Wightman TV's Community Channel 6 for viewers throughout North Wellington and Centre Wellington. The CSGW Series was also recognized by CSI as Best Media - Digital for the program, and the submission from CSGW and The Grand at 101 – Swap Talk was also recognized internationally for Best Media – Radio.



#HTinWC and #SAinWC was recognized as Best Specialized Training – Human Trafficking and made special note of the videos created for the initiative as well as the web pages. These videos can be viewed on CSGW's YouTube channel. The web pages are at www.htinwc.com www.sainwc.com. Remarkably, CSGW received a total of three Productivity Awards in the categories of Total Arrests, Total Property Recovered and Total Seizures. This is a result of the outstanding impact Tipsters had on the community 2021.

"As a Board we are honored and very appreciative to be recognized by OACS & CSI," said CSGW Board President Deryck West, "We are proud to receive these awards, as it demonstrates that our efforts and teamwork are worthwhile, and that hopefully we are making a difference in the communities we serve. 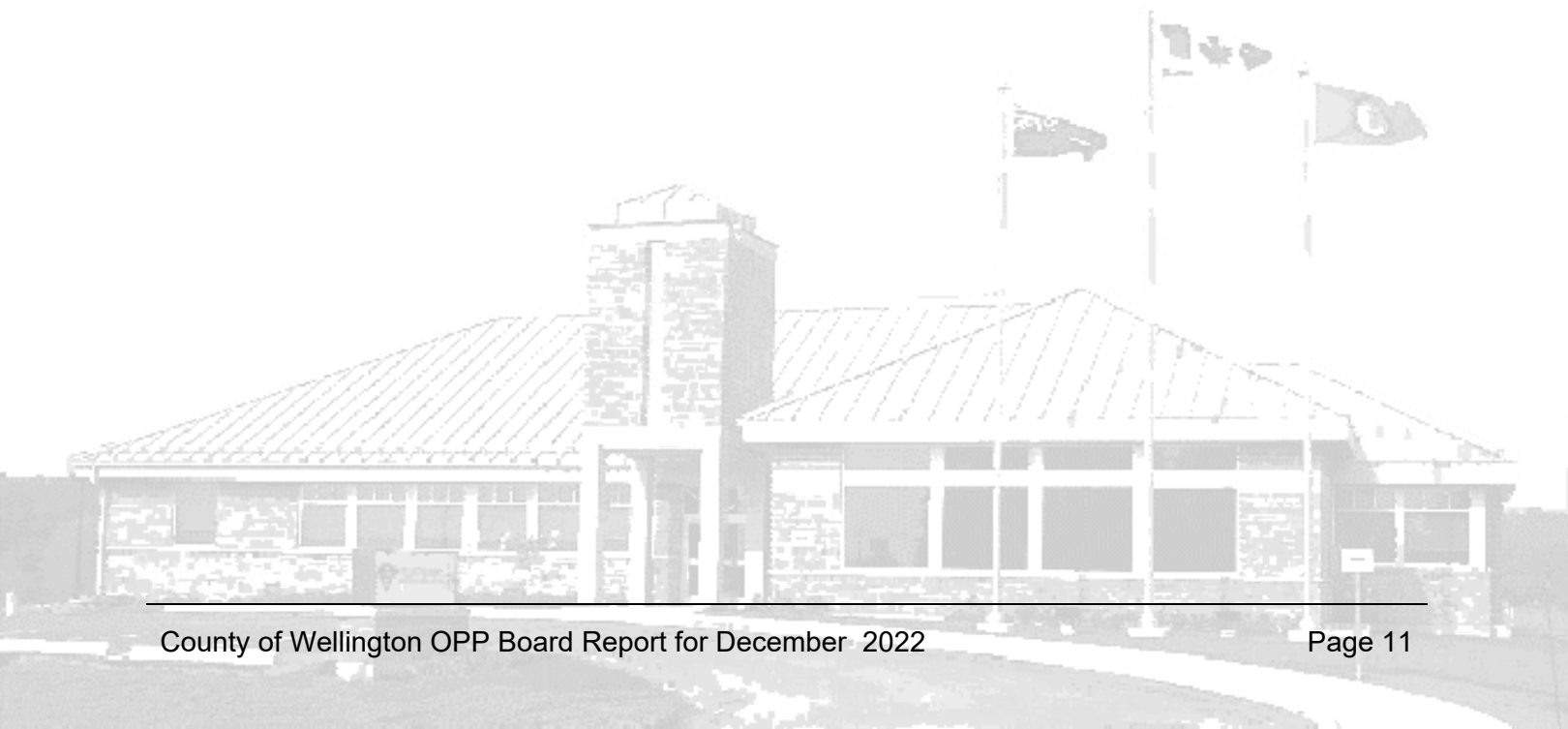
anyone considering partnering, volunteering, donating or even crime reporting to Crime Stoppers Guelph Wellington, will be reassured with these announcements.”

Aside from the aforementioned awards, CSGW has been active in the community, supporting Anti-Fraud initiatives and offering Human Trafficking presentations to students at Centre Wellington District High School in Fergus.

The 5 Tips, 5 Ideas 5, Signs Cyber Safety and Human Trafficking training offered to parents and guardians has also been launched, with three in person bookings in November alone. There will be virtual options promoted in the new year.

CSGW received funds from the Ministry of the Solicitor General on Nov. 28 and will designate as many of these dollars as possible before the close of the Year 1 term. This funding is to support Hate Crime and Fraud education, awareness, and prevention in the County of Wellington in partnership with Wellington County OPP and Victim Services Wellington.

January is Crime Stoppers month and the theme for 2023 is Stand Up, Stay Together. 2023 also marks the 35th anniversary of CSGW. The Board will determine how this milestone is celebrated.

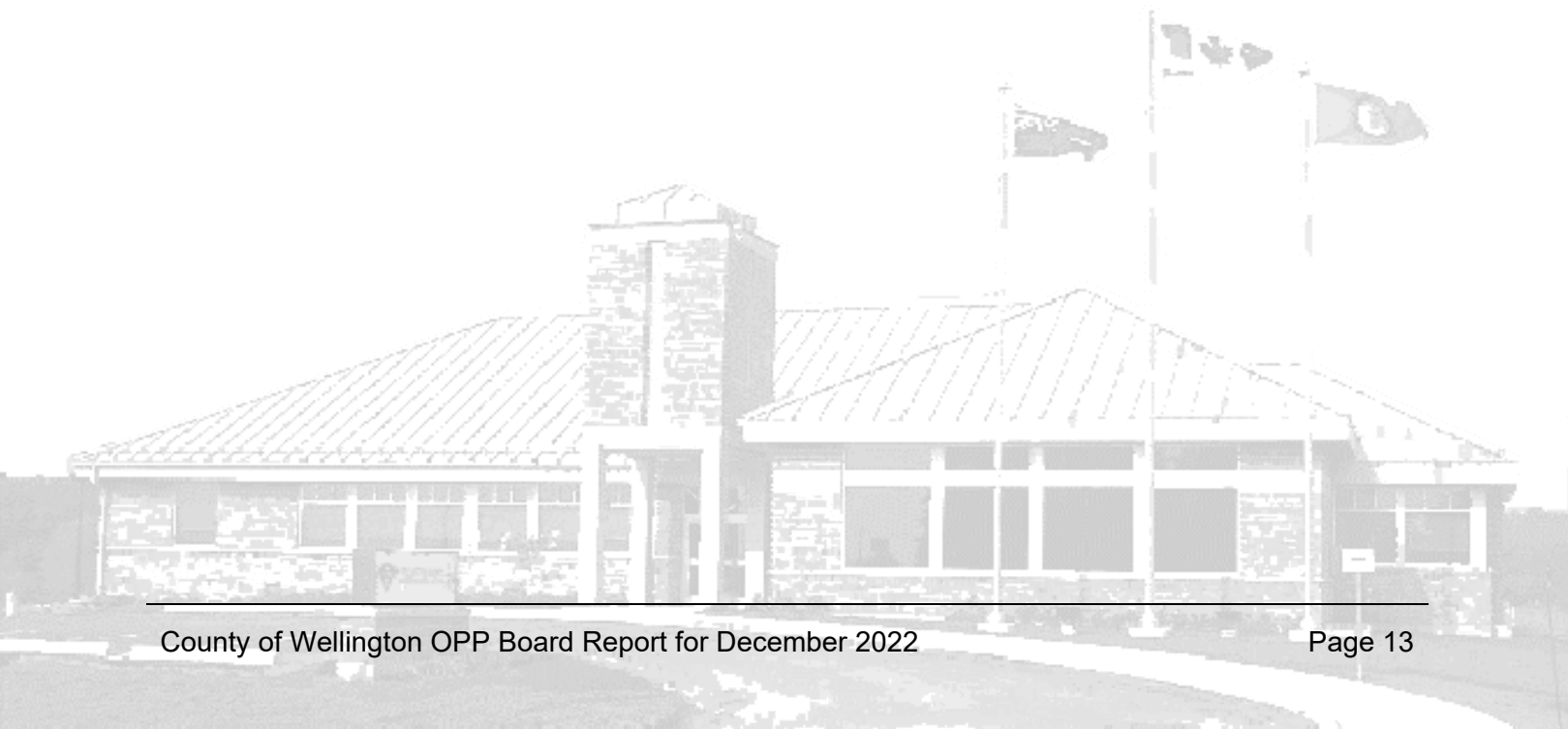
Court

Thank you to everyone who donated, your donations were greatly appreciated. And thank you to everyone who organized this endeavour.

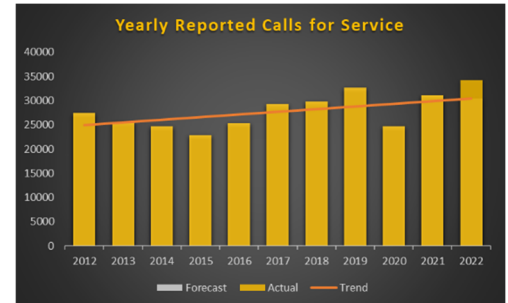


Statistics Summary

Calls for Service

Year to date calls for service have increased 10% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 10% increase over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 10% increase over December 2021.

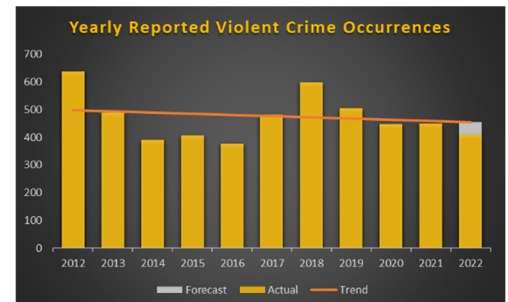
Calls for service have exceeded the projected 2022 values as well as the highest observed pre-pandemic level (2019).



Violent Crime

Violent Crime continues trending lower since 2018 and there continues to be a projected decrease in violent crime for 2022.

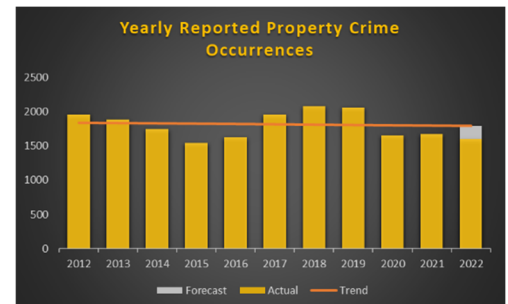
Year to date violent crime has decreased 9% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 29% decrease over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 40% decrease over December 2021.



Property Crime

Property Crime has also had an observable decrease in occurrences in 2021. Current trends project a decrease over 2021.

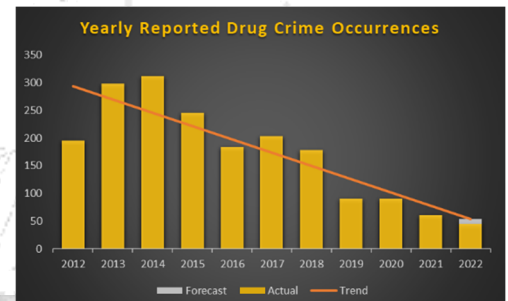
Year to date property crime has decreased 5% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 38% decrease over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 30% decrease over December 2021.



Drug Crime *

Drug Crime has continued to trend lower than previous years. The current trend continues to follow 2021 with a slight decrease in 2022 over 2021 is now anticipated.

Year to date drug crime has decreased 18% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 50% decrease in over November 2021. Statistics for December 2022 were not available at the time of this report.

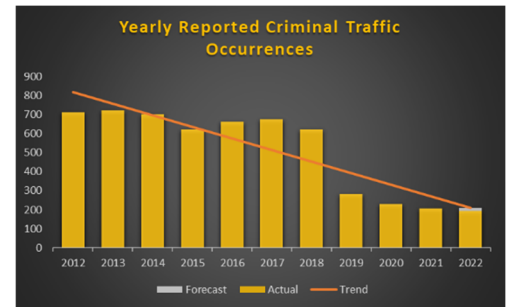

Criminal Traffic Offences

Criminal Traffic occurrences also continued to trend lower. The current trend continues to follow the 2021 results and a slight decrease over 2022 is anticipated.

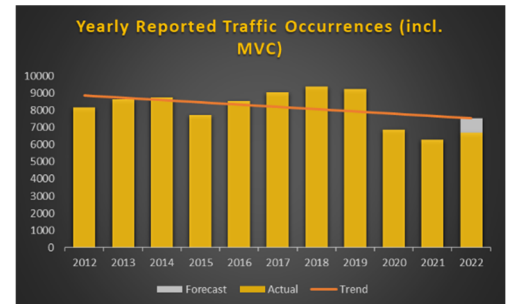
Year to date criminal traffic occurrences have decreased by 7% over the same period last year with November 2022 remaining stable over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 42% decrease over December 2021.



Traffic Related Occurrences

Reductions were observed in traffic occurrences during 2020 and 2021 however an increase over 2021 has already been realized.

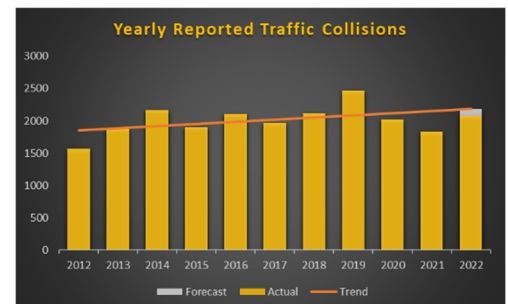
Year to date traffic occurrences have increased 6% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 18% increase in occurrences over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 3% increase over December 2021.



Motor Vehicle Collisions

Reductions in vehicle collisions were enjoyed during 2020 and 2021 however an increase over the previous two years has been observed.

Year to date collisions have increased 15% over the same period last year with November 2022 showing a 14% increase in collisions over November 2021 and December 2022 currently showing a 15% increase over December 2021.

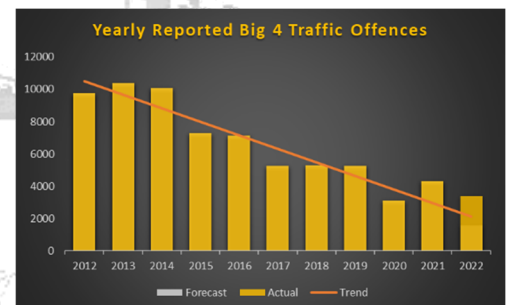


Big 4 Traffic (*Impaired Operation – Distracted Driving – Seatbelts – Speeding*)

Statistically, an increase in Big 4 Traffic Offences is anticipated.

Year to date Big 4 offences have decreased 18% over the same period last year with October 2022 showing a 26% decrease in offences over October 2021 and November 2022 currently showing a 6% reduction over November 2021. Some data is unavailable for this category due to delays in data propagation.

Report Summary

December 2022 was yet another busy month for Wellington County OPP. With COVID lockdowns seemingly in the distant past, Christmas parades were back in order. In partnership with Municipal Works and local Fire Departments officers from multiple units provided security and traffic control across Wellington County.

On top of this, officers were out in force to assist the motoring public on December 23rd, 2022, when Southern Ontario was hit, by what was being deemed “The Storm of a Generation”. Officers respond to a considerable amount of motor vehicle collisions and abandoned motor vehicles across the County. Thankfully, Wellington County OPP and the public made it through this once in a generation event without any serious injuries. Unfortunately, one OPP vehicle was struck by a passing motor vehicle while the officer was assisting another member of the public. The officer and those involved sustained no injuries.

Officers were also out conducting Festive R.I.D.E programs across the County throughout December 2022. Officers were able to locate multiple people driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drug taking them off the roads and possibly preventing a serious collision. Wellington County OPP once again wants to remind drivers. If you are going to consume alcohol or drugs, please do not get behind the wheel of a motor vehicle; call a taxi, make arrangements beforehand for someone to pick you up. Serious or fatal collisions due to drunk driving are preventable and it starts with each of us, each of us can make the decision not to drink and drive.

And finally, at the time of writing this, winter seems to be taking a brief break after the avalanche of snow it dumped on us on December 23rd. A reminder to everyone, winter will be back, driving conditions will worsen as winter drags on. Remember to drive according to the weather conditions, slow down, clean the snow off your entire vehicle, leave a little earlier and arrive alive.
